Comparative and Superlative Adjectives

In English, adjectives are used to describe nouns. When we compare two or more things using adjectives, we use **comparative** and **superlative** forms.

1. Comparative Adjectives

The **comparative** form of an adjective is used to compare two things or people. It generally shows that one thing has more of a quality than the other.

2. Superlative Adjectives

The **superlative** form is used to compare **three or more things** or people, showing that something has the most or least of a particular quality.

3. Irregular Comparative and Superlative Forms

Some adjectives do not follow the regular rules. They are **irregular**.

- Good → Better → Best
- Bad → Worse → Worst
- Far → Farther/Further → Farthest/Furthest
- Many → More → Most
- Little → Less → Least

Key Points to Remember:

- **Comparative** adjectives compare **two** things.
 - Example: "My house is **bigger** than your house."
- **Superlative** adjectives compare **three or more** things.
 - Example: "That is the **fastest** car in the race."

Remember:

Here's a table with the **most common irregular comparative and superlative adjectives**:

Adjective	Comparative	Superlative
good	better	best
bad	worse	worst
far	farther/further	farthest/furthest
little	less	least
many	more	most
much	more	most
old	older	oldest
